Beschreibung/ Ziele der	Constitutionalism is often identified with the existence of a						
Veranstaltung	written constitution, yet the mere presence of a constitutional						
	text does not satisfy alone the demands of constitutionalism.						
	Although these demands have changed over time, a common						
	set of values, institutions, and mechanisms are recognizable.						
	History has favored the rise of constitutionalism.						
	Constitutionalism provides stability. However, questions						
	remained about how constitutional structures deal with						
	profound crisis. In the past decade, in the United States and						
	elsewhere we have experienced severe crises, such as the						
	current war against terrorism, the financial crisis or the 2000						
	post-election dispute between the two major political parties.						
	These crises have challenged in one way or another the						
	commitment to the principles of constitutionalism						
	The seminar will focus on three topics: a. the Constitution and						
	the use of government power during war and national						
	emergencies, with a specific focus on the War on Terrorism						
	and the Guantanamo issue; b. the Constitution and the use of						
	government power during domestic emergencies and

	economic crises, with a specific focus on the role of government in the financial markets; and, c. electoral democracy and constitutional crisis, with a special focus on moments in which elections are followed by constitutional crisis such as the 2000 US election. The goals of the seminar are twofold: first, introduce students to American Constitutional theory and practice and, second, compare lessons learned with the German and European experience. This seminar explores the ambivalent relationship between the tradition of constitutionalism and episodes of social and political crises that have emerged over the last three centuries. The sessions focus systematically on selected events. The objective is to elicit questions and examine themes rather than providing students with a complete survey of the academic work in this area. <b>Seminar Structure</b> The seminar is divided in twelve sessions (one hour and thirty minutes each). Each session – except for the first session – begins with a short discussion of an American constitutional controversy or case. The case is used to frame the questions and main themes. This is not a seminar on American constitutional law. It uses court cases as a thought-provoking tool. Each session includes both a list of readings. The reading list is divided into three sections: required readings (must read for seminar participation, two or three readings per session), recommended readings (these are readings that I will refer to during the seminar), and post-seminar recommended readings.
