Beschreibung/ Ziele der	Human rights entered political discourse towards the end of the
Veranstaltung	Second World War and have become an inescapable discourse over the
	past thirty years. They have become 'the ideology after the end of ideologies' and a way of conducting politics according to ethical norms.
	They are used to justify a variety of different policies, including armed
	intervention, overthrow of governments, political support for
	minorities, conditions on trade agreements, provision of food and
	medical aid to starving populations. There is, however, some
	uneasiness about the appeal to human rights. When it comes to the
	point, no one is quite sure how we are to justify the claim that humans (all humans? only humans?) have these rights. And what are the rights
	that all humans are supposed to have? Do they include food for the
	starving, freedom for the oppressed, health care for the sick? Are
	human rights universal? If so, who guarantees rights? How do rights
	unsettle or promote understandings of citizenship and belonging?
	We will discuss these questions by exploring the intersect of human
	rights, citizenship and migration. Some of the questions we will investigate are: How does the language of human rights affect
	citizenship regimes, immigration policies and politics? How do states
	define their interests and responsibilities regarding the management
	of migration, border controls or relationships with their diaspora?
	How do immigration policies, coated in the language of rights, impact
	population flows and migrants' political, economic and civic
	engagements in the host state and in the homeland? Last but not least,
	how do migrants contest, subvert, reinterpret, and negotiate institutional and legal opportunities and restrictions?
	In addition to theoretical formulations, both readings and select visual
	materials will aim to stimulate a close comparison of citizenship
	regimes, immigration policies, and migrants' practices in the context of
	the US and the European Union.
