Recent scholarship in the study of masculinities suggests any number of ways in which this field has begun to move beyond the cataloging of pluralized masculinities that has characterized so much scholarship on this topic. The organizers of this conference believe that masculinities should be examined at a number of different analytic levels, ranging from the most location-oriented and culturally specific, to the national, to the transnational.

In this context, this conference will focus on the articulation of masculinities over the last three decades in Britain and the U.S. What lines of exchange and influence in the cultural and literary imagining of masculinity can be traced between Britain and the U.S. during the last thirty years? How do recent articulations of masculinity re-imagine established understandings of gender? How should we understand the ways in which relations between hegemonic and counterheaemonic masculinities operate both similarly and differently in these two locations?
