Family Policy – Institutions, Outcomes & Challenges Workshop Dresden, 10-11 April 2014

Family policy is a contentious topic throughout the developed world. Facing fertility rates around or below replacement levels, politicians in many countries call for an active family policy that slows down or even reverses this demographic trend. An effective family policy can also contribute to reconciling work and family, it can help to increase the labor market participation of women and it may be an important element in distributing towards young families. It is far from obvious what elements are needed to make family policy successful with respect to all these objectives. Pursuing quite different policy routes, European countries vary substantially in outcomes. This diversity provides an interesting laboratory for studying the effectiveness of instruments and institutions.

The workshop aims at a broad theoretical and/or empirical analysis of institutions, outcomes and remaining challenges in family policy. Some of the sub-fields that can be covered at the workshop are the following:

- Fertility: Why are monetary incentives often very ineffective in influencing fertility beyond pure tempo effects? Is there a sound efficiency argument for government intervention in individual fertility choices?
- Labor market participation: How can family and work be reconciled? Will an increase in labor market flexibility promote or hinder fertility? Is the interplay between institutions and monetary incentives crucial for female labor market participation?
- Poverty alleviation: What kind of transfer scheme is able to reduce the risk of poverty, e.g., among single mothers? Does poverty risk have an influence on fertility choices?
- Child care: How should child care institutions be financed? Why are governments willing to subsidize parents for raising their children at home (Betreuungsgeld, Kontanstøtte)? What are the economic and social consequences of such a policy?
- Education, human capital formation and integration: How do policy measures affect the human capital formation and its intergenerational transmission? To what extent can family policy facilitate upward social mobility and foster social integration?
- Public finances: How cost effective are the various family policies for a given objective?
