Open Science Criteria in Appointment Commissions

Michael reports from the biopsychology appointment commissions. For the first time, a digital questionnaire has been developed to determine an Open Science score reflecting the applicants' experience. The questions and evaluation are based on the DORA-Preprint. The statements were checked randomly. If an applicant is not to be invited, reasons must be given. It was accepted that the person was in the lower third of the Open Science Score, for example. However, the OS score cannot compensate for possible weaknesses (e.g., lack of third-party funding).

There is a discussion about whether we should aim for OSIP members to always be represented in appointment commissions? Those present are in support of this, but it should in particular be active members who have already participated in meetings. The OSIP statement says: "13. As members of committees (e.g., tenure track, appointment committees, teaching, professional societies) or editorial boards, we will promote the values of open science." Proposal: When it becomes known that an appointment commission is to be set up, it will be communicated via the internal OSIP distribution list to find a member of OSIP willing to take part.

Miscellaneous

- At future OSIP meetings, there will be a fixed agenda item "News". Under this item, everyone can give updates on topics that they are interested in (current experiences with OS in their own research, interesting projects, etc.).
- In the summer semester 2023, Josephine Zerna and Christoph Scheffel will offer an Open Science office hour on a pilot basis. This can be used e.g. by PhD students of the faculty to clarify psychology-specific OS questions. The office hour should also fulfill a distributor function. For this purpose, a list will be created in which OSIP members can enter their fields of experience (e.g. experiences with open data in clinical data; storage of EEG data...). Specific inquiries can then be forwarded to these persons. Interesting topics can of course also be discussed in an OSIP meeting. For general inquiries about OS, they can be referred to the SLUB Open Science Lab, ZPID or similar. The office hour will be advertised via the OSIP website and the faculty mailing list.
- The "experience list" will be stored in a newly established GitLab Repository.
- There is a short exchange of experiences on the topic of OS in teaching.
- Anne G\u00e4rtner reminds that comments on the 2 DORA papers are still welcome (Deadline: 30.03.23).
- DGPs is looking at how OS can be implemented specifically in clinical psychology. Anja Kräplin will report when there is news.

The next OSIP meeting is sheduled for April 5 at 1:30 pm. The link to will be sent out via the mailing list about one week before the meeting. Everyone is welcome to propose topics.
