

## EXAM INFORMATION FOR KPP STUDENTS

#### General information

- The exam registration takes place via the web-based exam system HISQIS.

#### KPP1 (CAN; HPSTS clinical psychology): Disorder models and intervention theory

Responsible for modules: Prof. Dr. Philipp Kanske

It is a mixed exam consisting of multiple-choice and open questions. You have a total of <u>90 minutes</u>. The examination includes the following courses:

V Clinical Psychology: Disorder Models and Intervention Theory (Lecturer: Prof. Dr. Kanske)

V General and Special Psychotherapy (Lecturer: Prof. Dr. Jürgen Hoyer)

V Research questions in clinical psychology and psychotherapy (Lecturer: Dr. Lars Pieper)

The basis for the examination is the content dealt with in the courses (see slides of the courses), as well as the literature listed there. Especially relevant are the corresponding chapters of the textbook (Wittchen & Hoyer, 2011) and the DSM-5.

With regard to "V Clinical Psychology: Disorder Models and Intervention Theory", the entire last lecture date (29.01.2018 "New Developments in Disorder Conception and Intervention") is not relevant to the examination. The limitations regarding "V research questions of clinical psychology and psychotherapy" are indicated directly in Opal at the event.

#### **CPP 3: Intervention and procedure deepening**

An oral test of 25 minutes will be held, usually in the examiner's office. The examination covers the contents of the events:

• ESE Conversational techniques

• ESE Clinical-psychological Intervention Procedures (Intervention Internship)

The basic material are the corresponding chapters from part B of the textbook (Wittchen & Hoyer), as well as the literature given in the courses. The examination covers the content defined in the learning objectives of the courses and examines not only knowledge but also application skills. It is recommended that the sections on intervention in the fault chapters in Part C of the textbook should also be reviewed.

The examiners are informed about the contents of the courses and have exam questions from the respective lecturers. The basic material - if available - is always the corresponding textbook chapter (in Wittchen & Hoyer). Please note that all exam questions mentioned in the textbook or seminar documents are sample questions and not binding questions. The examiner is responsible for selecting questions and setting priorities within the selected topics.

It is a multiple-choice exam. You have a total of <u>90 minutes</u>. The exam consists of two parts. You have to choose <u>two</u> out of the following three courses of the last semester:

- "Diagnostics in Childhood and Adolescence" (Voss)
- "Autism spectrum disorder" (Stietz)
