Dr. Michael Hohmuth

Fascinated by secure operating systems

Dr. Michael Hohmuth learned programming as a child – by mail. He studied computer science, an unpopular subject at the time, not only out of interest, but also because he wanted to stay in his hometown of Dresden. Today, he runs the Dresden-based software company Kernkonzept.

Finding your dream job, with knowledge, experience, contacts – and perseverance

Dr. Caroline Förster, who holds a doctorate in History and Communication Science, began her career with the desire to make historical documentaries. Today, as the Managing Director of the Dresden Historical Society, she is an expert in history, science and media. In this role, she publishes the Dresdner Hefte, among other things.

Maximilian Hansen studied architecture. It took him seven years to graduate as he was also working during his studies. This experience still helps him today. While he worked on the Sagrada Familia as a student and created a conservation concept for a Persian temple complex for his thesis, his own company is now focused on sustainable trade fair construction, event equipment and paper architecture.

Back in her school days, Anja Lorenz participated in Math Olympiads and was interested in computers. She was one of the few girls in computer science classes. She loved computer games and 3D animated movies, hoping she could pursue a career in this area too. Today, she is a Research Assistant at Technische Hochschule Lübeck and is also known as the Queen of MOOC-Maker. She is also a witness to how learning has changed over time.

Introducing international alumni associations

TUD Alumni Vietnam

The TUD Alumni Vietnam association (TUDAV) was founded in 1994 on the initiative of Vietnamese TUD alumni. The objective was and is to bring together Vietnamese alumni of TU Dresden in their home country. The goal is to establish contact with each other. It is maintained and strengthened through annual meetings, excursions and theater visits, which are all part of the association's activities.

Today, the association has around 160 members. These are not only in contact with TU Dresden, but also with German institutions in Vietnam. Since 1995, TUDAV has been a branch of the central Vietnamese-German Friendship Association in Hanoi, the capital of Vietnam. As such, the association also organizes meetings with various German delegations. For example, the association welcomed two delegations from TUD and the then Deputy Mayor of Dresden, Dirk Hilbert, to Hanoi. Many members of the association studied at TUD before reunification, and some are now entering retirement age. The TUDAV members meet twice a year. The Christmas get-together has become a tradition, which of course includes real Dresden stollen! A second meeting usually takes place in the summer. Between 50 and 60 members get involved in the club meetings. Many have known each other for years and many friendships have grown out of these meetings. They are all connected by their studies or time researching at TUD. They regularly exchange information about events, news from Dresden and German-Vietnamese relations.

TU Dresden has always had Hungarian students. The cultural bond formed between the alumni during their four to five years of study lasts a lifetime. The most active among them founded the Association of German Academics from Hungary (DU) in 1994. It is committed to Hungarian alumni from all German universities; however, many members of the association have their academic roots at TU Dresden.

The association is committed to maintaining contact between its members and also wants to help deepen German-Hungarian relations. An important part of the DU program is the annual conference, in which topics from the field of business and culture are discussed - usually from a special German-Hungarian-European perspective. It deals with topics such as 1,100 years of German-Hungarian relations, bilingualism, Germans and Hungarians, seen through the eyes of their neighbors or patriotism in the EU.

The association regularly publishes alumni news, three times a year, with articles in Hungarian and German. To mark the association's tenth anniversary, there was a commemorative edition with biographies, anecdotes and photos of the alumni.

These activities are complemented by events, excursions, children's programs and gatherings organized by groups of friends in a particular region or by a particular year of alumni.

The association currently has around 1,200 members, more than half of whom studied in Dresden. TUD alumni can be found on both the association's board and the supervisory board.

Association head, Tamás Bornemissza, is looking forward to welcoming new members from all age groups: "Especially newly graduated or current students who are still living in Germany. What connects us? We communicate with one another and understand each other with half-German-half-Hungarian words," he says.

DRESDEN-concept – Science and Innovation Campus

DRESDEN-concept is the research alliance of excellence uniting TU Dresden with local non-university research and cultural institutions.

In 2010, TU Dresden joined forces with 14 partner institutions in research and culture to form the DRESDEN-concept alliance. This was a massive success: DRESDEN-concept proved to be a significant factor that helped our university to stand out in the federal and state excellence competitions, in which TU Dresden gained the University of Excellence title in 2012 and successfully defended it in 2019. Today, DRESDEN-concept comprises 45 partner institutions, including TUD Dresden University of Technology, local institutes belonging to Germany's four major scientific organizations – the Max Planck Society, the Leibniz and Helmholtz Associations and the Fraunhofer-Gesellschaft – as well as other research institutions, universities and research-guided cultural institutions.

The partners collaborate and profit from the best possible synergies in research and education, as well as infrastructure and administration. This is evidenced by the identification and coordination of focal areas of research and the shared use of infrastructure as well as the shared acquisition of bright minds and internationally renowned talent at the research hub that is the city of Dresden.

The Scientific Area Network offers the perfect platform to network with colleagues conducting research in the circular economy as part of the DRESDEN-concept alliance, as well as to discuss the latest research results and to work together towards achieving a resource-conserving future.



The structure of the alliance and the various types of events it produces support the development of DRESDEN-concept into an internationally visible Science and Innovation Campus.

Science and Innovation Campus:

The DRESDEN-concept Board defines the strategy for the continued development of the alliance. This consists of the Rector (chairperson) and the chancellor of TU Dresden as well as five elected, leading members of the non-university DRESDEN-concept member institutions.

The DRESDEN-concept Board embodies its role as a strategy committee for Dresden as a science location. Leading scientists at the research and cultural institutions meet regularly to discuss key topics and strategies and to submit recommendations to the Board.

In the Administrative and Infrastructure Committee (AIC), the commercial directors coordinate the infrastructural and administrative ventures of their institutions, implement the resolutions of the Board and the AGM, all the while supporting the further development of the alliance.

The Scientific Area Committees (SACs) represent Dresden's research strengths as a science hub: SAC 1: Biomedicine and Bioengineering; SAC 2: Information Technology and Microelectronics; SAC 3: Materials and Structures; SAC 4: Culture and Societal Change. The SACs are the core of the scientific cross-institute cooperation and serve to identify and prioritize research topics.

With the Scientific Area Networks (SANs), DRESDEN-concept has paved the way for a research-guided, interdisciplinary networking

The International Institute (IHI) Zittau

Studying and researching biodiversity and responsible management in an interdisciplinary, friendly and international environment

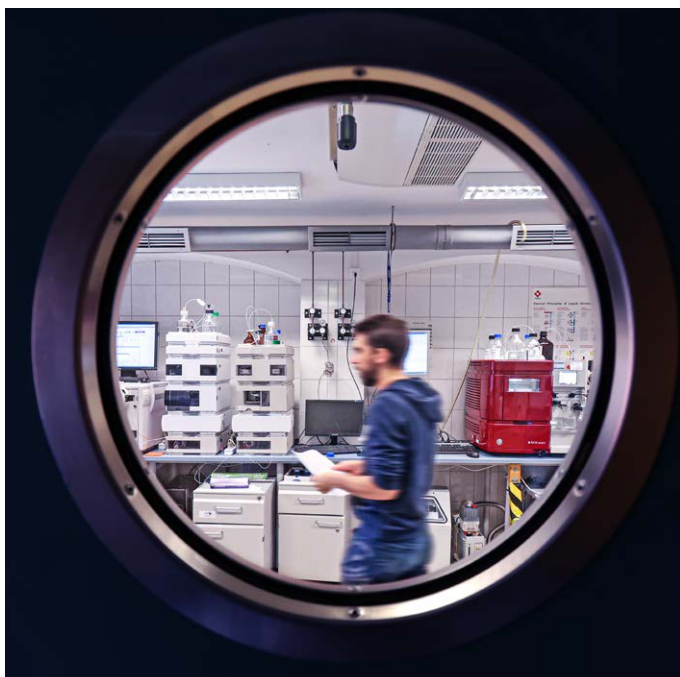
In 1993, five universities from Saxony, Poland and the Czech Republic founded a model project for joint, cross-border learning. Since 2013, the International University Institute (IHI) Zittau has been a central scientific institution of TU Dresden. The institute, with eleven Chairs, four of which are cooperative with institutions of the Leibniz Association, stands for the motto "Biodiversity and Responsible Management." With non-university partners (Senckenberg and Institute for Ecological Planning – IÖR) and partner faculties within TU Dresden (Environmental Sciences, Economics and Biology), teaching and research is carried out on the topics of ecosystem services, sustainability and their management. Studying in an informal atmosphere and a highly-international setting – that really is something special!

You can experience this in the five Master's degree courses at IHI Zittau:

- Biotechnology and Applied Ecology (Master of Science)
- Business Ethics and Responsible Management (Master of Arts)
- Ecosystem Services (Master of Science)
- International Management (Master of Science)
- Organismic and Molecular Biodiversity (Master of Science)

On average, 300 students are enrolled here. They hail from around 40 nations on four continents and study together in this interdisciplinary and family-oriented environment. Small student groups, excellent supervision and attractive living costs when studying at the border triangle between Germany, Poland and the Czech Republic are just some of the benefits that students particularly appreciate.

View into an IHI laboratory



The Ecosystem Services and Organismic and Molecular Biodiversity degree courses, which are taught entirely in English, benefit from the research-strong Chairs and enjoy great popularity, both nationally and internationally. Students on the Biotechnology and Applied Ecology degree program are also very close to the research process. By cooperating with researchers in state-of-the-art laboratories and taking part in numerous excursions, students acquire valuable skills that prepare them perfectly for their future careers.

The International Management course scores highly with students thanks to its attractive double degree program option: With semesters abroad at the University of Economics in Wrocław, Andrassy University in Budapest or the University of Pardubice, they have the opportunity to obtain two degrees. The Central European Campus Neisse/ Nisa with TU Liberec offers a special variant of the double degree. These two study locations (Zittau and Liberec in Czechia) are just over half an hour away from each other by train. This means that the syllabus can be put together very flexibly at two locations in two countries. In the unique Business Ethics and Responsible Management degree program, students learn how responsible management can be implemented and what particular challenges exist in an international context.

... today's Rectorate Building

was inaugurated in 1926 as the Dresden Erato Singers' Association's own fraternity house? Even today, original tiles inside the building, with colorful student motifs, are a reminder of this origin. There also is a sandstone coat of arms, with an Erato compass on the west side, visible from the canteen.

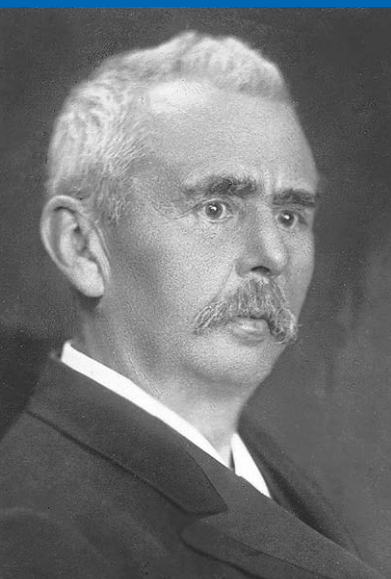


... TU Dresden's art collection

also includes 350,000 herbarium specimens, i.e. dried and pressed plants? The Herbarium Dresdense is registered in the Index Herbariorum, the international directory of the world's herbaria, and actively loans specimens from scientific institutions all over the world.

... Friedrich Siemens

was awarded the first honorary doctorate of the Technical University of Dresden in 1900 „for his immortal merits, which he earned through the inventions of the regenerative furnace for generating high temperatures, the tank furnace for melting glass, the regenerative burner for producing highly luminous flames and the chemical regeneration of the heat of the flame gases of highly heated furnaces“?

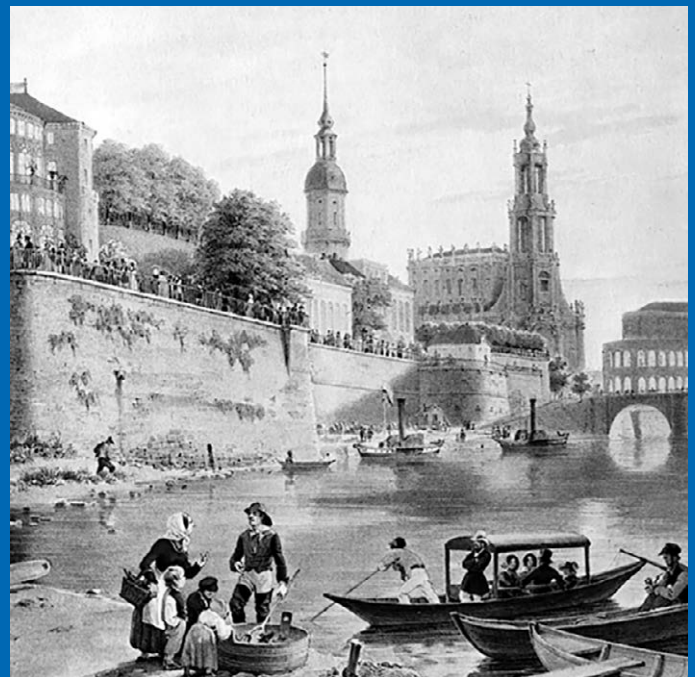


... six professors

were rectors at the university several times? Cornelius Gurlitt (pictured left), Adolph Nägel, Walther Hempel, Martin Krause, Ernst von Meyer and Richard Mollier were rectors of TU Dresden twice – at a time when rectors were still elected annually.

... Johanna Weinmeister

was the first female alumna of the TH Dresden? Women were officially allowed to complete a full degree at the THD from 1907. Johanna Weinmeister studied to become a teacher and successfully passed the state examination for the higher education authority in 1913.



... the Technische Bildungsanstalt,

was the predecessor institution of TU Dresden, had its first domicile in a garden pavilion on Brühl's Terrace in 1828? It was not until 1833 that it moved to the former armory at Jüdenhof, due to lack of space.



... with Max Foerster and Fritz Foerster

two brothers were rectors of the university, each one once? Max Foerster presided over the THD in 1913/1914, while Fritz Foerster, who was one year older, headed the university in 1917/1918.

... the GFF

was founded on December 7, 1921 as the Gesellschaft von Förderern und Freunden der Technischen Hochschule e.V.? At its founding meeting, the GFF already had 450 members, including industrialists and bankers. Deleted from the register of associations in 1949 by decree of the state government, it was re-established in 1991 as the Gesellschaft von Freunden und Förderern der Technischen Universität Dresden e.V. (Society of Friends and Supporters of the TUD Dresden University of Technology).

... the post office

of TU Dresden has its own postcode, 01062? As a result, postcards and letters to your alma mater can be sent without the street name. However, for parcels, express and courier deliveries, the usual address rules apply.

... that TU Dresden

was even immortalized on the Dresden Procession of Princes? The third person in the final group – following a pupil from the Dresden Kreuzschule and a student from Leipzig University – is a student from TH Dresden waving a flag.

... a particular curiosity

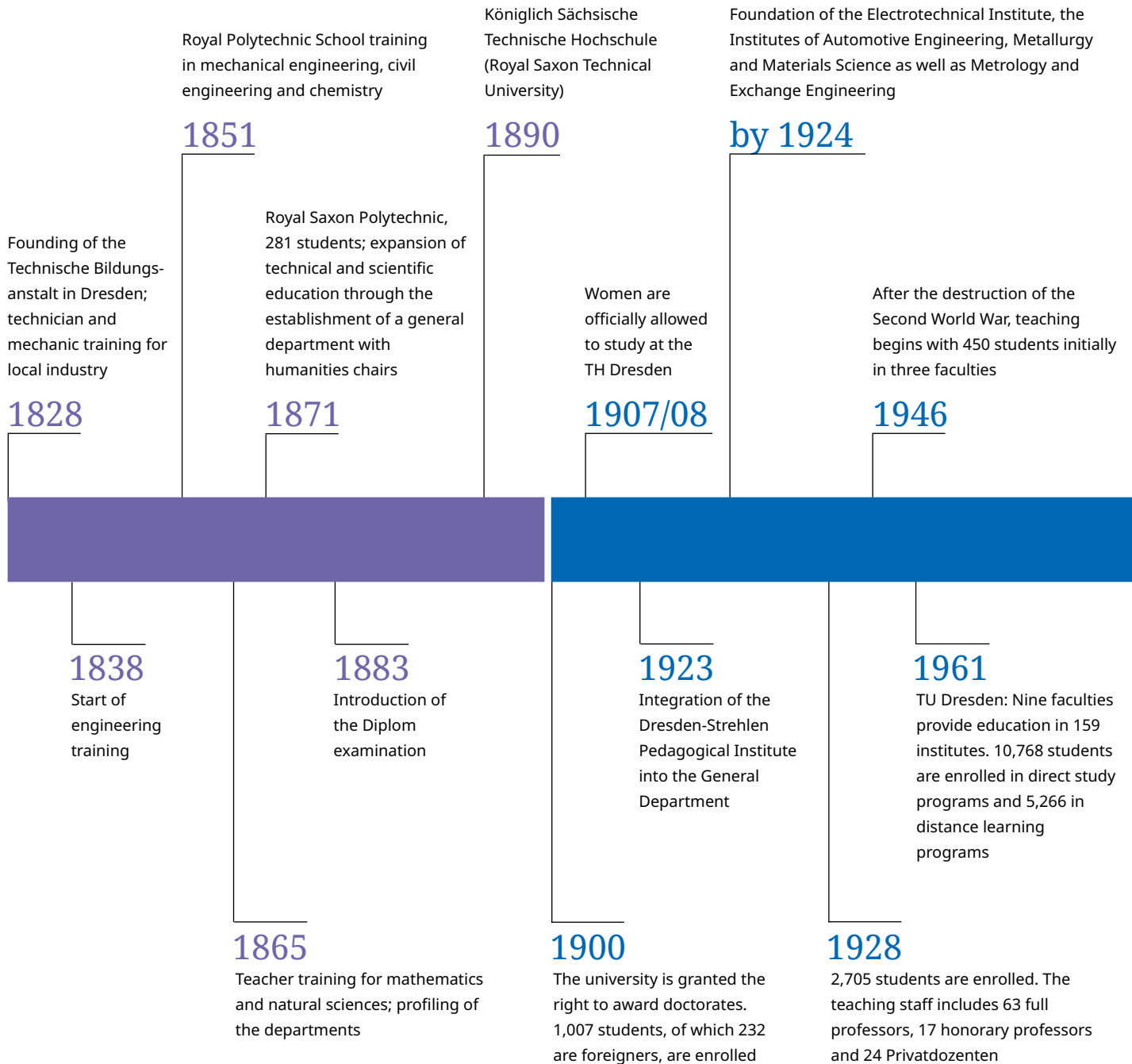
of university history can be visited? Engineer Walther Pauer was taken prisoner of war in France during the First World War and was forced to write his doctoral thesis in shorthand on a toilet roll. A replica of the so-called “Pauer Roll” has been hanging in the Center for Energy Technology since 2021, while the original has been part of the Custody's University History Collection since 2015.

... there is a memorial for professors

of the TH Dresden at the Alter Annenfriedhof? During the bombing of Dresden in February 1945, many of the cemetery's gravestones were destroyed, including those of professors who had taught at the TH Dresden before 1945. From 1979 to 1983, TUD remodeled the ruined family grave site of Hermann Hettner, professor of art history at the TH, into a memorial for eight other professors whose graves had been destroyed. The memorial was designed by TUD graduate, Jürgen Schieferdecker.

Are you interested in doing an internship abroad after you finish your studies? Then, the LEONARDO-OFFICE SAXONY is the right place for you. Graduates can also find everything they need to know about internships abroad here.

From Saxony to the world: Discover, experience, and become more!

This is the slogan of the LEONARDO OFFICE SAXONY – TU Dresden’s international internship office. In the past 32 years, more than 5,000 students and alumni from Saxony have been supported with funding for their internships in other countries – both in European and non-European countries.

Graduate funding

The European mobility program Erasmus+ enables not only students but also alumni to receive funding for an internship abroad up to twelve months after graduation. This is particularly interesting for those who did not have the opportunity for an internship abroad during their studies or who want to do a second internship in preparation for starting their career. Alumni receive individual support from the LEONARDO OFFICE SAXONY when planning such an internship abroad. It is possible to use the office’s extensive pool of companies with more than 2,500 partners – potential internship companies. Once you have found a host institution, applying for the scholarship is very easy. The scholarship offers between EUR 600 and EUR 1,000 per month.

If you are already firmly established in your professional life, you may be able to come to TUD for teaching purposes (teaching, lectures, workshops with students) and receive Erasmus+ funding ranging between EUR 500 and EUR 1,000. With the Graduate Academy (GA) and the Postdoc Center, TU Dresden offers doctoral candidates and postdocs tailor-made services for researchers before, during and after their doctorate.

Their services include:

- Individual counseling and coaching
- An interdisciplinary qualification program
- A writing workshop
- Information and networking events
- Mentoring programs
- Numerous funding programs

Membership of the Graduate Academy or the Postdoc Center is a prerequisite for taking advantage of these offers.

As a doctoral candidate or postdoc, you can apply free of charge.

The **advisory service** consists of the following:

- Initial counseling on all questions related to doctoral studies
- Funding
- Writing
- Career counseling and CV check,
- Conflict counseling and mediation
- Individual coaching.

The **qualification program** of the GA and the Postdoc Center is offered every semester and includes interdisciplinary workshops in German and English on the following:

- Leadership and management skills
- Career planning
- Science in practice/science management
- Scientific work
- Science communication

With the **Career Program: Business or the Future Career Program: Innovation** doctoral students and postdocs will be fully prepared for a career outside of academia or as future start-up founders.

The **GA-Writing Lab** offers doctoral candidates and postdocs an interdisciplinary support program for all aspects of academic writing.

They also offer individual consultations and short workshops, writing groups, writing weeks, an annual writing retreat, the Grant Writing Boot Camp for postdocs, and workstations.

In addition, you can benefit from regular information and **networking events** such as PhD Day, Postdoc Day, Career Day, company visits or career lunch talks, postdoc talks and the summer party.

The various **funding programs for doctoral candidates and postdocs** include long-term and short-term scholarships in addition to grants for mobility and networking.

All doctoral candidates at TU Dresden can elect the **Doctoral Council**, once per year.

The Doctoral Council aims to:

- Strengthen the visibility of doctoral candidates at the university,
- Create a platform for cross-faculty dialog between doctoral candidates
- Contribute suggestions and proposals for the further development of GA services.

With the founding of the Postdoc Center, a **Postdoc Representative** was established as well.

The Postdoc Representative strives to:

- Support postdocs in networking across disciplines,
- Represent postdoc interests
- Participate actively in decision-making processes.

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Scholarships for the talented: “Deutschland” scholarship

For many years, TUD has been awarding the Germany Scholarship to talented students, thereby supporting the promotion of early-career researchers and helping them pursue their studies with a boost.

The scholarship of EUR 300 per month is granted for at least two semesters. Half of it is financed by companies, private individuals and foundations, while the Federal Ministry of Education and Research doubles the donation.
