#### Welcome

We are happy to invite you to the 2nd international summer school "Human Rights in Theory and Practice", which will take place in Dresden from September 5<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> 2021. The summer school will focus on the topic of "The European Convention on Human Rights in Times of Crises" and will explore various challenges and opportunities for the European Human Rights System arising out of situations of crisis. Themes such as emergency situations, populism, migration, and the role of economic, social, and cultural rights in the context of crisis will be explored from an interdisciplinary perspective. Once again, it will be one of the summer school's special ingredients that speakers will include both academics as well as practitioners, offering the unique opportunity to gain insights into current theoretical discussions as well as the everyday challenges of practicing law.

## Who should participate?

The summer school is designed for advanced students of law, political science, international relations, and similar fields. Prior knowledge about the European Human Rights System may be beneficial but is not required.

## Certificate

Upon successful completion of the Summer School vou will receive a certificate with 5 ECTS.

## Course Venue

The summer school is located in the city of Dresden. Famous for its beautiful baroque scenery and its rich cultural life, it also is home to one of Germany's eleven Universities of Excellence. Besides, the history of the city has been closely intertwined with the major lines of 20th century European history. Heavily bombed during World War II, Dresden became part of the socialist German Democratic Republic after the war. In our social activities, we will explore Dresden, its cultural life and its history and look for links to human rights questions. But we will also experience Dresden as a city that has a lot to offer in terms of leisure activities, from bars and restaurants to outdoor sports.

#### Accommodation

Accommodation is not provided and should be organized by every participant, but we will share recommendations for affordable accommodation and plan to organize a couch surfing platform with local students from Dresden.
